Construction Set to Begin in Spring 2016 Broader Support Needed from Alumni

It's an exciting time to be a member of the Psi Chapter of Sigma Chi! At its annual meeting in October, members of the House Corporation Board of Directors, after receiving reports from the Building Committee, the Capital Campaign Committee, and the Board treasurer, voted unanimously to begin construction on the addition and renovation of our Chapter House beginning in spring 2016.

We are very grateful for the 128 Alumni who made this possible by their early financial contributions. Because of them, more than \$1.2 million dollars have already been committed to the *Psi Chapter: Honoring Our Past, Building Our Future* Capital Campaign. We will soon begin work on the first phase of our project, which will almost double our House's square footage by constructing a much needed dedicated social and activity space directly adjacent to the existing living quarters.

But there is still much to be done before our entire construction plan can be implemented,

including the renovation of the primary living space of 608 Preston Place. To reach our goal, it is important to have broader support from all Psi Alumni. To date, only nine percent of Brothers have donated to the Campaign, far below the average twenty-five percent rate of Greek fundraising efforts like ours.

We know that Psi Chapter is not an average fraternity...we can do better.

If you have not yet donated, NOW IS THE TIME. Just fill out and return the enclosed pledge form to make your gift to the Capital Campaign. Members of the House Corporation Board are meeting again in early 2016 to finalize construction plans, and it is important the goals of our renovation project do not have to be scaled back because of a shortage of Alumni support. Remember, all pledges can be spread out over a five-year period, an option that many Psi Alumni have taken advantage of in order to stretch their gift to its full potential.

If you are among the 128 Alumni who have already donated...thank you for your leadership.

Two years ago, when discussions began about the need for building a new Chapter Room and social space, we were not sure reaching this goal would be possible. But because of you, it's happening now. To those of you who have already made your pledge, please reach out to Brothers from your class and share with them why you decided to give back to the future of our Chapter at the University of Virginia. We are going to need the support of every Psi Alumnus in order to make this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity a reality.

Only the Good Die Young: A Tribute to Rick Donlan

*They say there's a heaven for those who will wait
Some say it's better but I say it ain't

Sinners are much more fun...

Richard M. Donlan '68, known to us as Rick, grew up in Hampton, Virginia. He entered the University in the fall of 1964. He became a member of the 1964-65 pledge class, and was initiated in 1965, with his brother **Jay (Psi '66)** putting on his Sigma Chi pin.

Rick was one of the most popular Brothers of his era. He was smart, funny, friendly, and athletic. He was the kind of guy you wanted to be like. One of the traits that made him such a great friend was that he didn't seem to realize how extraordinary a person he was. He was naturally self-effacing, humble, and down-to-earth.


In 1966-1967, during Rick's third year at Virginia, the impact of a changing world was being felt by all of us. The Vietnam War was escalating, and, unless you were already enrolled in ROTC, you faced the draft once out of college. On any given day, you could find Brothers gathered somewhere in the

house discussing obligation to country, military service, and the right and wrong of war. Although an organized, hard-core resistance to the war was not yet present on the Grounds, there were plenty of men at the University who were at best ambivalent about the idea of living or dying in Southeast Asia.

Such hyperbole was not in the DNA of Rick Donlan. He considered serving in the military as his duty and responsibility as an able-bodied citizen of the United States. He once told me, after relentlessly making fun of my Army ROTC polished dress helmet and belt buckle, that he was sure that, like him, I felt it a privilege to serve my country in the military. Although I wasn't completely sure I believed what Rick said as much as he did, it somehow gave me a sense of personal pride that Rick Donlan thought that way about me. Such was the way we all looked up to him.

In the fall of 1967, Rick left school and enlisted in the Army. He volunteered for the infantry, became airborne qualified, and was sent to Vietnam in July 1968 as part of the 101st Airborne Division. He was killed in February 1969 near Phan Tiet.

In 2006, Jay Donlan attended a reunion of the 506th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division, honoring soldiers from that unit who lost their lives in Vietnam. While there, Jay met Rick's squad leader, who described him as "serious, often reading books during down times, and always telling the younger soldiers that they should read more." As put best by Rick's close friend, **Ray "Tudy" Hicks (Psi '68)**, a fellow Army veteran also from Hampton, Virginia, "Although one of the misconceptions of that unfortunate war was that the typical casualty was a poor reluctant draftee, in reality, it was far too often guys like Rick who were responsible, conscientious, and duty-bound."



To honor the memory of Rick, his family is establishing an Intramural Athlete of the Year award to be presented yearly to the Brother judged to have contributed most to Psi's intramural program.

All of us in the family of Psi of Sigma Chi are proud to call Rick Donlan one of our own . . . the only Brother to give his life for our country in the Vietnam War.

A Few Words: A Tribute to Glenn Kirwin

Glenn Kirwin '83 died in the World Trade Center on 9/11. He was a great brother, friend, mentor, father, and husband. Glenn had an insatiable curiosity and desire to solve problems. His mind was always two steps ahead of others, which made him an invaluable Pro-Consul in 1981-82. Although he parlayed his forward thinking mind into a very successful career on Wall Street, a large part of his legacy is how closely he was entwined with his family and Psi Brothers.



Glenn's University of Virginia pedigree was unparalleled. His father, uncle, and all four of his

brothers went to U.Va., each excelling in his own way. His brother, **Peter**, was also a member of the Psi chapter ('85). As one of the few New Yorkers in the house at the time, Glenn steadily influenced the Brotherhood with some liberal thinking and Yankee enthusiasm. He was also always up for some mischief and facilitating a great party. He always had time to stop and help anyone who needed it. A great listener, he always encouraged people to try things outside of their comfort zone.

If Glenn were alive today, he would tell you he is most proud of his wife, Joan Boswell Kirwin (a U.Va. '83 graduate and

member of Kappa Delta Sorority) and their two sons, Miles and Troy, who also went to U.Va. and blossomed during their four years at the University. Joan was a dorm mate and good friend to fifteen Psi Brothers during college and remains close to many of them today.

A broad collection of Brothers from the classes of '81, '82, '83, and '84 have formed a scholarship in Glenn's name, which now has an endowment of over \$800,000. In addition, many of these same Brothers have made generous pledges to the Psi of Sigma Chi Capital Campaign in memory of Glenn.

CHAPTER ETERNAL

E. M. Childs '41, a former Chief Judge of Maryland’s Fifth Judicial Circuit, entered Chapter Eternal on August 5, 2015. After earning his Bachelor’s Degree in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Virginia, he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force and assigned as an aeronautical engineer to Pan American World Airways, where he helped to design the first around-the-world commercial flight. After resigning from Pan American airlines he earned his law degree at the University of Maryland. His career in law included being Assistant to the Vice President and General Counsel of the Western Maryland Railway; building a private law practice in Annapolis, Maryland; and in 1965 accepting an appointment as Circuit Judge for Anne Arundel, Howard, and Carroll Counties, a which position he held for sixteen years. Judge Childs is survived by his wife of seventy four years Elizabeth Blackmer Childs; his three children Elizabeth Dryden Murck, Walter B. Childs, and Eugene M. Childs, Jr.; seven grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

J. W. “Vijaya” Stallings '66 entered Chapter Eternal on September 20, 2014. Vijaya was born in Savannah, Georgia, grew up in Newport News, Virginia, and graduated from the University with a Bachelor’s Degree in

History and Political Science. Subsequently he earned a Master’s Degree in Counselling Psychology with a holistic health specialization from John F. Kennedy University at Pleasant Hill, California; graduated from the Ayurvedic Institute in Albuquerque, New Mexico; and received his Ph.D. in Religious Studies from Emerson Theological Institute in Oakhurst, California. Vijaya’s career included serving as a Captain in the U.S. Air Force from 1966 to 1972; working in the real estate and mortgage industries; and teaching and helping others as a certified Ayurvedic practitioner and personal coach. In 2009 Vijaya authored a book *Instilling Hope, Healing Fear*. He is survived by his wife Ella; his sons John W. Stallings Jr. and Paul Ellis; his daughters Stacy Froyen and Kelly Greene; his sister Gloria Brooks and brother Stan Stallings; and seven grandchildren.

Jim Evans '77 entered Chapter Eternal on May 11, 2015. After graduating in 1977, he attended the University of Richmond Law School and began a career in law. Jim was a partner in Gilliam and Evans Law Firm in Chesterfield, Virginia. He was a proud member of Psi of Sigma Chi who talked with many of his Fraternity Brothers every week. Jim was a very active member in his community, serving on numerous boards including

Jim was a lifelong member of St. John's Church, where he was Warden and served on the Vestry for many decades. Jim's sense of humor was legendary, and his commitment to his friends and family was unbreakable. Jim was preceded in death by his parents, Agnes and Bill Evans, and his brother, Dunbar. He is survived by his loving wife Tamara Joyner Evans; his three sons Jamie Evans, Jordan Evans, and John Evans; his stepchildren Cortney Arnold and Brandon Puster; his sisters Anne Rowan Connors and Becky Romaine; numerous cousins, nieces, and nephews; and his grandson Charlie Arnold.

ALUMNI NEWS

Robert W. Banta '43 remembers his time as Questor of Psi of Sigma Chi from 1941-42 when the Chapter's address was 1 University Circle.

James C. Mackay '54 enjoys watching and reveling in his children's careers, who live all

over the United States from Boise, Idaho to Washington D.C., and overseas in England.

John M. Sadler '54 is well known in the metallurgy field for his "isotope enrichment process," that penetrates and welds all the commercially popular aluminum at temperatures below that of their melting temperatures, penetrating the oxide surfaces as desired. He lives primarily in Ponte Vedra, Florida, but spends his winters in France and summers in Camden, Maine.

Robert R. Sowder '58 served in the United States Army Counter Intelligence Corps as an agent during the Korean and Cold War eras.
